f not, you may be thinking of sending one in time for Valentine's Day on 14th February.

Did you know that, after Christmas, Valentine's Day is said to be the second most popular day to send a card and that the date never changes? Whatever country or place you call home, Valentine's Day is always February 14th.

It's also called Saint Valentine's Day or the Feast of Saint Valentine, is a globally celebrated holiday and is a way to let that special someone know how much you care with a thoughtful message, a fun activity or a handcrafted card.

Before it was known as Valentine's Day, a pagan fertility ritual was held in Rome every February until the Pope abolished it and replaced the festival with *Saint Valentine's Day*. From then, it was a feast day in the Catholic Calendar of Saints.

It was linked to romantic love following Chaucer's late 14th century poem called 'Parliament of Fowls', which describes a group of birds that gathered together to find their mates on 'seynt valentynes day'.

Legend has it Valentine's Day is on the 14th because a priest called Valentine was performing secret marriages that had been forbidden by Emperor Claudius II of Rome. Because of this legend, Saint Valentine became known as the patron saint of love.



However, another legend says that Saint Valentine refused to convert to paganism and was executed by Roman Emperor Claudius II. Prior to his execution, he was able to miraculously heal the daughter of his jailer, who then converted to Christianity along with his family.





The Hambly family of Lenham - Past 2

Continuing the generations of the Hamblys serialised for Focus by Chris Allen

rthur William was the first son in the Hambly family and, like his father, was a man of the railways. In 1881 when he was born, the railways were at the very forefront of technology; it was a complete revolution that opened up the country with fast reliable travel that had never before been possible. Arthur lived to 97 and he witnessed the complete life of steam on the railways.

He went to school in Lenham and his first job was as a junior clerk with the London, Chatham & Dover Railway at Sheerness station. There he met and married his wife Elizabeth and they had two daughters Muriel and Dorothy. Arthur worked hard

and secured the position of chief clerk at Bromley South Station.

The picture (below) of the staff at this station shows Arthur sitting on the bench third from left in the bowler hat. On the extreme right is the cabbie in the days of horse drawn taxis.



The family travelled widely in Europe; they were great theatre goers and were all life members at Glyndebourne. Dorothy and Muriel embarked on a European tour in a rickety old bus to visit nine countries in 1938 when Hitler was sweeping through the region.

The girls' love of travel was not limited to the railways as can be seen from the picture (top right) of their first car and their enthusiasm to show it off in the most fashionable style of the day.

During WW1, Muriel knitted for the troops and was awarded an Empire Day certificate for each year of the war. She received a 'Thank You' letter from a Sergeant Marsh who had been given

the scarf when in the trenches a few days before Christmas 1914. The letter was written on lightweight paper with an indelible pencil and shows how very much it meant to receive a Christmas gift in what must have seemed an almost impossible situation.

The war effort was enhanced greatly by troops that volunteered from the Commonwealth. One of these was Billie who came from New Zealand and was lucky enough to come through the war unscathed. He fell in love with May (Bertha) Hambly and they decided to return to New Zealand together and never returned to the UK.

Arthur completed his days with the railways as Station Master at Hayes where one could be whisked into the centre of London on the new fast electric service.



On completion of his railway service, he retired to Whitstable and was elected as a member of Canterbury City Council. The girls both secured positions with the Whitstable Oyster Company and they all continued to visit Lenham on a regular basis.

- Volunteer Coordinator. To liaison closely with the team and to make contact with those on our volunteer list to ensure maximum turn out for events



However, after a while the family started going to the Church of St. Mary in Lenham. There they had their very own box pew, which was a privilege of the tenant of Court Lodge. Others, like the Barrs from East Lenham, also enjoyed the privilege of having a pew reserved for them.

The squire, Akers Douglas, was driven to church in a two-horse brougham and sat with his family in an elevated position in the chancel area, well above the rest of the congregation.

Herbert received his first schooling in the chapel but then he and his sister Elizabeth attended the village

ne of the children's pastimes was catching and killing vermin; rats, of course, but also sparrows, which raided the stored corn, and bullfinches, which stripped the buds from the fruit trees. Those with the highest number of kills got a prize at the "Rats and Sparrows Club".

The tenant farmers were allowed to shoot rabbits and hares but no game birds or deer, which was a privilege of the squire. His gamekeepers reared the pheasants for the yearly shoot and young Herbert stood with his gun at his side and watched, longing to be old enough to join in. His father and mother, however, were occasionally invited

school, which was run by 'Old Thunder Bottom', the headmaster Mr. Underwood, here pictured with a class of boys (date unknown).



Later, Herbert went to Brunswick School in Maidstone. The family was not wealthy enough to allow him to go to university, so he took a correspondence course and studied from home in the comfortable office of Court Lodge. He worked from 9am to 4pm, only having a break for lunch. The school holidays were a welcome change when he could enjoy the

haymaking, harvesting and some ploughing matches.

Herbert Todd looked back at this time with mixed feelings because the farm made, like many farms at the time, just enough money to maintain the family. His father was very worried about this and took to drink. He eventually became an alcoholic. After a very difficult time for the family, he was sent away to a home and

He lived out his time at Court Lodge and his coffin was carried on top of one of the wagons. It was led by the head ploughman, followed by many farmers from the area.

Recipe of the Month Mrs Wood's Potato Chowder

An update from your local MP, Helen Whately



've been inundated with emails about the impact of the budget from businesses and farmers - but also from our local doctors. In December I held a round table with GPs to hear from them directly.

GPs and practice managers told me how the rise in National Insurance Contributions announced in the Budget will increase their costs by tens of thousands of pounds.

As a result, plans to recruit extra doctors are now on hold. Instead, redundancies may be on the cards.

This is the last thing patients want to hear when it's already hard to get an appointment in many doctors' surgeries. After that meeting I have sent letters to the Secretary of State for Health and the Chancellor urging them to listen to GPs – together with Care Homes and Hospices who are also being hard-hit by the NI rise.

Assisted Dying Bill

As I write, the assisted dying bill is making its way through Parliament. Many people have strong views on both sides of the argument. So, for this month's parish update, I thought it would be a good idea to write about this. I am grateful to everyone who contacted me to share their personal experiences and views. I thought hard and read widely before deciding how to vote on the bill.

As an MP I want to make life better for people. I believe people should be free to make their own choices. But we should also look out for people. The world can be cruel. Not everyone is kind or good. I support assisted dying in principle. I am



lucky that my own experiences of death have not been traumatic, but I know about horrific deaths that no amount of palliative care could alleviate. I have heard from constituents who see a cruel death coming and have asked me to vote for assisted dying for their sake. In that situation I believe I would want the choice of assisted dying for myself.

Despite that, I voted against the assisted dying bill before Christmas because it was not good enough and the safeguards were not really safeguards. One flaw is the definition of Terminal Illness. This is much broader than it might at first appear. It could, for instance, include diabetes, and other diseases which quickly become terminal if someone decides to stop their treatment.

Another problem is the approach to mental capacity. The bill uses the approach in the Mental Capacity Act 2005 which aims to give people as much control as possible over living their lives. It errs on the side of maximising

capacity because it was never intended for use when the question is about hastening death. The bill does not properly safeguard against coercion. A doctor involved could be concerned a patient is being coerced. But if they denied the application for assisted dying, it could just be made to another doctor. No one is under any obligation to investigate whether coercion is occurring.

This law will not just affect those who want it. It will affect everyone and particularly anyone who may be nearing the end of their life or living with serious illness or disability. The choice will be there whether you want it or not; the choice to continue to live or to opt for an early death. It will change our society and we must get it right. I will be looking to Kim Leadbeater and the bill committee. to make the bill better before it returns. for third reading.

The Common law Marriage Myth: Why Cohabiting Partners Need a Will

ach year in England and Wales, a significant proportion of people die without a valid Will. In fact, two-thirds of people die without having made any provisions for how their estate should be distributed. When this happens, the deceased's assets are divided according to the Intestacy Rules. Under these rules, the deceased's estate is generally distributed to their spouse or civil partner first, then descendants, and so forth.

However, cohabiting partners (those in a romantic relationship and living together) are not included in the rules, which can lead to distressing and unexpected consequences for a surviving partner.

The misconception of the "Common Law Marriage"

Research conducted by the Universities of Sheffield and Cardiff highlights that many individuals are under the impression that living together for a certain period of time confers the same legal and financial rights similar to those of a married couple or a couple in a civil partnership. However, this is a misconception. Cohabitation does not



equate to marriage or a civil partnership under UK law, and there is no legal status granting cohabiting couples the same rights as married couples or those in a civil partnership, despite the length of time they have been together, lived together, or if they share children. The lack of legal recognition under the intestacy rules can lead to significant financial hardship. If one partner dies without a valid will, the surviving partner may find themselves excluded from the estate entirely. In this case, the surviving partner may need to pursue a legal claim for a share of the estate, which can be both time-consuming and costly.

Importance of Making a Will

With marriage rates steadily declining and the proportion of cohabiting couples on the rise – from 20.6% in the 2011 census to 24.3% in the 2021 census – more and more people will face the unfortunate reality that, under the intestacy rules, their cohabiting partner will not receive anything from their estate, leaving surviving partners in a troublesome position and the deceased's true wishes being dismissed.

The Law Commission previously called for reform of the intestacy rules; however, all suggestions have been rejected by Parliament on the grounds that implementing such change would introduce unnecessary complexity to the system.

The Women and Equalities Committee are still fighting for change to the legislation; however, the intestacy rules are still not able to be relied on for cohabiting couples and the importance of creating a will cannot be overstated. A Will provides the only sure way for individuals to ensure that their estate is distributed according to their wishes.

By making a will, cohabiting couples can avoid the risks and uncertainties associated with intestacy and ensure that their partner is provided for upon their death. Please contact one of our solicitors for more information.

Climate Change

Pat Crawford reports - "NO FARMING, NO FOOD"

"...rally your MP

to support our

region's farms.'

lerted by the simple but lucidly powerful message 'No farming, no food', more of the general public are protesting the government's tax onslaught on family farms.

At the time of going to press the government continues to claim that changes to tax won't affect the 'vast majority' of farmers; this despite research undertaken by the NFU (National Farmers' Union) indicating that 75% of family farms will suffer.

The term 'asset rich, cash poor' is often applied to farming. According to the Office of National Statistics, 30% of farms made a loss in 2023-24 while a further 25% had an income of less than £25,000. Equating this to an hourly rate opens a clear window on 'cash poor'!

Looked at from a different angle; many rural-related organisations are expressing concern that the tax will have catastrophic consequences for the UK's ability to protect food security. Currently

we produce approximately 60% of the food consumed in this country - the other 40% is imported from countries where farming is increasingly affected by climate change. It isn't necessary to be a statistician (or politician) to predict future challenges!

Children have written letters to the Prime Minister detailing what they want to happen to British farming this year. You can make your voice heard by rallying your MP to support our region's farms.



Kent continues to have the most farms and smallholdings in the south east – getting on for three thousand. We can rely on our farmers to produce nutritious, safe food, employ the highest livestock husbandry standards in the world and add multiple benefits to our

beautiful countryside.

Flooding and bad weather in the New Year affected farms in various parts of the UK creating similar conditions to those


experienced at the beginning of 2024. The generally warmer winters are likely to impact on fruit crops such as apples and pears (recall that Kent stands supreme in production of top fruit) because the number of 'chill hours' needed to ensure plentiful healthy blossom and buds are threatened by the changing climate.


Does this mean some of our treasured favourites will eventually have to be replaced with varieties that require less chill hours?







Year 6's Immersive WWII Experience at Kent Life. Written by Year 6.

ear 6 had an unforgettable trip to Kent Life as part of their WWII project.

Dressed as evacuees, the children stepped back in time to experience life during the 1940s.

The day began with an exciting activity; pretending to be on a train, being sent away from their homes as evacuees. This set the tone for a day packed with learning and hands-on workshops.

The first task involved writing heartfelt letters to their families, imagining the emotions of being far from loved ones. Next, the children explored the strategic routes that planes flew during the war and learned about the challenges of food rationing. This session highlighted the

resourcefulness required to live during wartime.

Her books are appreciated for their warmth and wisdom; so join Fern as she navigates life in her 60s faced with a series of life -altering events.


Losing her parents, her 20year marriage ending and brushes with serious illness, Fern decided to reconnect with her true self and, instead of fearing getting older, chose to create a new

A View from across the Pond

ebruary 15, 1965 Canada's

cherished single red maple leaf flag
became its first 'official' flag – flown
for the first time at noon on Parliament
Hill and across the nation and on this
date in 1996, National Flag Day of
Canada became 'official'.

Never formally adopted, three successive, formal designs of the 'Canadian Red Ensign' were flown as the 'distinctive Canadian flag' from 1868 to 1965.



1957 - 1965 design

Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson's 1963 election promise was for Canada to have its own flag. The clock was ticking. In 1967, Canada celebrated its 100th birthday of Confederation by hosting the World's Fair - Expo '67 in Montreal. How could Canada welcome the world without its own flag? The drama that ensued to achieve this goal is a thrilling chapter in Canadian history.

A parliamentary committee of 15 MP's was struck in 1964 - the "Great Flag Debate" began with plenty of political hullabaloo + national angst + 4,000 design submissions. Two finalist's designs were dubbed 'Pearson's Pennant' and 'Pearson's bloody rag'. Various details, especially from 'behind the scenes' during this process, will never be entirely known. Now deceased, many closely connected kept silent and others penned their versions.

Sample designs follow below:





The final 3 contenders were:





December, 1964, the present design was approved by Canada's Parliament. In London to attend Churchill's funeral, Pearson went to Buckingham Palace on January 28, 1965 to witness Her Majesty sign the Proclamation. Canada's flag became official! Now 60 years later, I believe it remains the best choice for ALL Canadians to proudly wave!

Government "Devolution" plans and what that means for us

At the end of December, the government published a White Paper which set out its plans for the reorganisation of local government. This is a far-reaching document with implications for the Kent and Medway area. If you wish to see the text of the announcement, given by Angela Rayner, MP, Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government, you can find that here: Deputy Prime Minister's speech on the Devolution White Paper - GOV.UK

The area known as Kent has one "first tier/ strategic" authority, Kent County Council (KCC), and 12 borough/district councils, of which Maidstone is one. Then, across Kent, there are over 300 parish and town councils as well, Lenham being one of these.

The county and borough/district councils,

along with the parish and town councils, are responsible for all the local authority-based services the citizens in the Kent area receive such as social care, education, highways maintenance, housing, planning, refuse collection, maintenance of parks and green spaces and many more.

Medway is already a Unitary Authority, which means it is responsible for delivering all the sort of services in Medway that are presently delivered by the county and borough councils in the Kent area.

The White Paper proposes that the top two tiers of county and borough/district councils which deliver the current local government arrangements across Kent will be abolished and new Unitary areas will be set up to deliver all the services, in the same way that Medway runs.

At this point it is not clear exactly how Kent will be reconfigured, but the possibility is that there will be three or four new unitary areas, with several of the current borough and district councils merging to form these. It is also possible there may be an elected regional Mayor to cover the whole of the restructured Kent/Medway area.

What the White Paper was "silent" on was the role of parish and town councils; no doubt this will emerge as details are firmed up.

It's understood that the leaders of both KCC and Medway Unitary Authority are in favour of supporting this change. It's also possible that the area may submit an early expression of interest to the Secretary of State to progress the proposed changes during the first

round. If that happens then it is possible that the County Council elections planned for this May may be cancelled.

The ambition for these significant changes to come into being is currently projected as 2026/27.

Achieving such change within this timeframe is going to be

a mammoth task. There are, though, already services such as Kent Fire and Rescue, the Police, and the Kent and Medway Health Care Partnership, which operate across the whole area and hopefully incorporating lessons learned from these services will assist with the re-organisational proposals.

We will endeavour to keep everyone informed as the details become clearer.

Jury Service

How it works and what to do if called

How it works

Jurors are chosen randomly from the electoral register. You'll be part of a jury of 12 people to decide the outcome of a criminal trial.

If you are called to attend jury service, you'll get a summons in the post and you must respond within 7 days and confirm if you can attend. If you don't respond (either on-line or by returning the form by post) you can be fined up to £1,000.

After you respond, the Jury Central Summoning Bureau will send you a letter to confirm details of your service, including when and where it will take place. If you asked to change the date or to be excused, the letter will explain if your request was accepted. You'll need to bring your summons or confirmation letter to court with you on your first day of service.

How long jury service lasts

Jury service usually lasts up to 10 working days. If the trial is likely to last longer than 10 days, jury staff will let you know. If the trial is shorter than 10 days, you may be asked to be a juror on other trials. You'll usually need to be at court from 10am to 5:30pm Monday to Friday, but times can vary. On the first day you will need to arrive earlier. The summons letter will specify the exact time.

Get help

Contact the Jury Central Summoning Bureau if you have questions about jury service or about a decision. It may be possible to change the location of your jury service if you've been summoned to a court far from where you live, e.g., if you've recently moved house or if you're at university and you've been summoned to a court near your family home.



Discussing the trial

You must **NOT** discuss the trial with anyone until it's finished, except with other jury members in the deliberation room. After the trial you must not talk about what happened in the deliberation room, even with family members. You can talk about what happened in the courtroom. In particular you must **NOT** post comments about the trial on social media, even after the trial's finished. This is contempt of court and you can be fined or sent to prison.

If anyone approaches you about the trial, tell a court officer. If you're approached outside court, tell a police officer.

What you can claim if you're an employee

You'll not be paid for doing jury service, but you can claim some money back if your earnings are affected. Many employers will continue to pay you as normal, but are not required to do so. If there's a shortfall, for each day you're at court, you can usually claim:

 up to £64.95 to help cover your loss of earnings and the cost of any care or childcare outside of your usual arrangements

- £5.71 for food and drink
- the cost of travel to and from court

You'll continue to get financial support and benefits (such as Universal Credit) for the first 8 weeks. After that, the court will give you a loss of earnings form to give to your benefit office or work coach.

Taking time off work

Give a copy of your jury summons to your employer. Your employer must let you have time off work, but can ask you to delay your jury service if your absence will have a serious effect on their business.

Loss of earnings, childcare and other care costs

How much you can claim to cover loss of earnings and care costs depends on the length of your jury service and how many hours you spend at court each day. For the first 10 days of jury service, you can claim up to:

- £64.95 a day if you spend more than 4 hours at court
- £32.47 a day if you spend 4 hours or less at court

If your jury service lasts longer than 10 working days, the amount you can claim increases. You'll be able to claim up to:

- £129.91 a day if you spend more than 4 hours at court
- £64.95 a day if you spend 4 hours or less at court

Travel and parking costs

How much you can claim depends on how you travel to court.

Nature Watch

Tis the season to be breeding!

ven though we are still in the grips of winter with snow flying and the temperatures low, we can now look to the time of year that the wildlife that surrounds us will be starting to strut their stuff to attract mates and start the new generation. The exact times that the breeding season starts is slightly different for each species and even within that species times will differ, but loosely you can say that breeding season goes from spring to summer.

Just how soon can the breeding season start?

the ones that are hiding under the fallen leaves and logs on the ground and in the damp and dark places. Here we have some slug eggs that have been laid under a log at a place in Lenham Heath. Laid in little clusters they look like little globes of jelly. Depending on when they were laid they can take longer to hatch and can take 10 to 100 days to hatch.

Not just the tiny creatures

Both newts (pictured above) and frogs will start to lay their eggs as early as February in ponds and other bodies of water. They will take varying times to hatch but by March you will see tadpoles swimming



through the water in search of food.
Usually you will see the eggs as a mass of jelly spheres all clumped together with black centres and you can actually see the embryos develop.

As the weather warms during spring we will begin to see signs of other small bugs and creepy crawlies begin the new cycle like these butterfly eggs.



One of the things we can do to help our wonderful wildlife is planting plants that butterflies and other insects would use for food and breeding. This would also help our birds and other small wildlife by providing food during their breeding seasons.

Preparing for the new arrivals

While the general period for breeding seasons is given as spring to summer, according to the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 the official start is February and lasts till 30 September. During this time it's forbidden to damage eggs or nests that are in use. Ways to help out our feathered friends are by installing nest boxes to give



them a safe place to raise a family or by not trimming hedges as they often use places like hedges to nest (like this goldfinch with fluff for the nest) which offer

protection from things like cats or birds of prey.

Nesting birds and their young

When the eggs start hatching the parent birds will start to collect food to feed the babies. This is when our efforts to encourage plant life to grow to help the insects will pay off. Here a blackbird (below) has a beak full of assorted bugs that it is carrying off to the nest. Often you will see the parent birds start to look quite bedraggled as they fly to and from the nests continually feeding the young ones.



They think it's all over, but alas it may not be

So after all the hard work providing everything their babies need to grow, you may think the parents have a rest, but often if it's early enough in the season there may be another brood to be had. The young birds still might ask for food even though they are fledged. Pictured below is a baby blue tit begging for food even though I had seen it feeding on its own.

Occasionally you may find a baby bird that has fallen from its nest. If this is the case you are allowed to find the nest and put it back if you are not disturbing the nest too much. It may be prudent to wait for a couple of hours though to see if the baby can fly or get back on its own.

So even though it's still gloomy and a bit dark, the new season of baby animals is on its way.



ebruary - the season of lambs, spring flowers, valentines, and Lincoln's birthday, my diary tells me. February 12th is still a state holiday if you happen to live in one of three states in the US.

It seems strange to us in Britain to imagine getting a day off for a prime minister's birthday, however famous. We do have various 'Bank Holidays' over the year and I am not sure of their origin, I just know how much I appreciate them when they pop up!

The word 'holidays' actually stems from their original source, they were the 'holy days' of the year when you were not expected to work but rather take time out and refocus on what really matters.

Many of our annual days off are still related to remembering and celebrating certain Christian feasts, events, traditions and rituals – Easter and Christmas, for instance. Naturally we are glad to have these days interspersed in our year. Without them where would the natural breaks be? They give us time to be thankful, to slow down and to be with friends and family; to draw aside from ordinary life and possibly think about matters of a different nature – spiritual, ethereal, liminal.

As Christians, and I will say as humans, believers or not, we are also encouraged to do this with one seventh of our week – shabbat, sabbath, Sunday, a day of rest. A day when 'thou shalt do no work, wherever you live'. See *Exodus 20:10*.

Sunday rest has been stolen from us in the past 40 or 50 years – tho' we did not see that coming. We just wanted to break away from legalism and religious enforcement. And that wasn't wrong. But I do wonder how this lack of rest has contributed to burn out, anxiety, disease, agitation, rage, conflict, depression and exhaustion – it is so prevalent among us.

Fascinating stuff – I can see over and over how faith and the practices attached to it of simplification, prayer, mindfulness, rest, generosity, hospitality, magnanimity and humility – living justly, loving mercy, and walking humbly with our God are actually good for us. (*Micah 6:7*)

God is not a tyrant – quite the opposite; He is desirous of healthy community, wellbeing for those He created and loves, and time – time for all of us and each of us to spend with Him, with each other and even with ourselves. This way we flourish. Simple.

Enjoy February, take a long slow look at the lambs over in the field – they know how to rest and reset by in green pastures by still waters..... The Lord really is our Good Shepherd.



Make preparations for possible flooding

aidstone Borough Council (MBC) is encouraging everyone to prepare for potential flooding **now**.

The Council is asking Maidstone residents to take steps and sign up for flood warnings. If people know what to do in a flood it can significantly reduce risk to life, damage to property and the suffering from mental health impacts in the future.

Only 27% of the properties at risk of flooding in Maidstone have registered for flood alerts:

Properties at risk: 5370: Number of people signed-up for alerts: 1406

The Council is reminding residents that they are responsible for their own flood protection equipment which may include sandbags. If anyone believes their home is at risk they should purchase these from builders' merchants now and store them at home ready to react quickly if there's a problem.

Cllr Clive English, MBC Cabinet
Member for Environmental Services and
Enforcement said: "By taking just one
action people can reduce the effects of
flooding on their homes, families and
even save a life. The best way to protect
yourself from flooding is to know what to
do in advance, follow the simple steps
on the Environment Agency website.

"In many flood risk areas, you can sign up for flood warnings. These warn of the risk of flooding from rivers, the sea and groundwater. You'll be alerted by phone, email or text when flooding is expected. Why not sign up now."



When areas across the borough are at risk of flooding MBC continues to support the Environment Agency (EA) to carry out its humanitarian responsibilities. Preventative steps for possible flooding include:

- To sign up for flood warnings: www.flood-warning-information. service.gov.uk/warnings
- Have a flood kit of essential items at home
- Check the Environment Agency website for flood warning information: https://flood-warning-information. service.gov.uk/warnings
- If they see any blockages in watercourses to report them to the EA's through a free 24-hour incident hotline: 0800 80 70 60
